







## Members' gardens open to celebrate our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

PS members have a long history of developing new ideas, services and opportunities since the Society was created 60 years ago. In 1957, just four keen plantsmen and nursery owners formed the HPS to promote and conserve perennial plants in all their diversity. Now there are over 6,000 members, a network of Local Groups, Special Interest Groups, a Seed Distribution

offering thousands of varieties, a plant Conservation Scheme, a series of booklets and an extensive photo library.

From the beginning members have enjoyed garden visits, the first to Bressingham in 1957; so perhaps it's surprising that this is the first England-and-Wales programme when 65 gardens of HPS members will be open to the public on dates between February and September. Each garden owner has chosen when they would like to open, so the garden can be seen at its peak and star plants can be at their best!

An entry fee will be charged, similar to that of the NGS. Apart from £1 to cover administration costs, money raised will go either to charity or to the local HPS group.

What a variety: particularly fine were 'Warwickshire Gemini,' Elmley Lovett,' Imperati,' Wendy's Gold,' and 'Sutton Courtenay,' all combining beautifully with a sheet of aconites and early narcissus 'Rinjvelds Early Sensation,' which I shall plant next year!
