Building an ericaceous bed - Derrick Saville

I have been looking to build an ericaceous bed, using an existing bed that I have.


This spring I topped up with more leaf mould, added a packet of Chempak base fertiliser and sulphate of iron.

The bed, a triangle, is now approximately 220sq/ft and 10-12" deep. I removed all the plant pots and settled them into their new home. As of today all are looking healthy and lush. The plentiful recent rains have also contributed. My only regret, is that I wish I had more shade and wind resistance.

So far I am pleased with the current results; just wished it was bigger. I have also been experimenting with planting shade tolerant smaller plants and bulbs, as I am looking to see which works and which doesn't.

So an on going fun experiment, which if successful will be worth the effort I have put in.

Toutes les plantes pour l'ombre – Caroline Stone

A couple of years ago I was shocked when rearranging my bookshelves to find how many books I had on shade and woodland plants. So, do I really need more? I have been enjoying Cédric Basset's Facebook posts so when he put out a new book in April, I decided that yes, the bookshelves did have space for another. 'Toutes les plantes pour l'ombre' is a lovely book. It is full of photographs which means that I can pour over it looking for inspiration for new plants to acquire. Do not be put off by the fact that it is in French. Firstly, French makes everything sound nicer! And secondly, it is not difficult to understand the text.

S&W Group members will not need convincing of the book's concept "Shade in the garden is not a problem, it is an opportunity!". The trouble with a book like this, however, is that it reminds me of all the things I have planted and never seen again! I am sure I had Ajuga incisa 'Frosted Jade'! And having become very tempted by the photographs of different forms of Syneilesis palmata the question will now be, where can I get them?

I am learning plenty from reading this book: salvias for shade – I had never considered that. Not only are there five salvia species for shade listed but a number of cultivars of those species. There were so many plants new to me that I was surprised that there wasn't more said about Eranthis. But there is so much included in the book that something has to be squeezed I suppose. I have recently had a bit of an epiphany about Mahonia so the two pages devoted to that family seemed a little too succinct too.

Cédric runs a nursery near Mont St Michel in Normandy. Problematic these days to get plants from there, I look forward to S&W Group meetings starting again in the hope that the plant sales tables might yield some of the temptations this book holds.

Any ideas? – Barbera Dygnas

Since the end of April I have been experiencing 'vandalism' in the garden. The first sign was an attack on *Ranunculus* ficaria 'Brazen Hussy', two plants of which were completely stripped of their leaves and flowers (photo attached). There was no sign of the leaves or flowers either around the plant or elsewhere in the garden.

I then found a selected pile of leaves left in the middle of the path: some cyclamen hederifolium, a sprig of epimedium, a piece of *Saxifraga* urbium, some narcissus leaves ... Something has been rollicking under the *Magnolia* stellata. *Dicentra* spectabilis 'Valentine', *Narcissus* 'Thalia' and Geranium nodosum 'Tony's Talisman' were flattened, as was *campanula* portenschlagia E.H.Frost and said S. urbium (no mean feat).

Many of the Shade Group members have woodland gardens with probably fairly extensive wildlife. Mine is a small suburban plot bounded by brick walls and fences. However, there is a badger hole in the corner from a sett in my neighbour's garden and a gap under a fence used by the neighbourhood cats. Foxes have been spotted at night on the road in front. Does anyone know which might be the culprit? What were they doing picking sprigs and leaves and leaving them on the path? And what did they do with the ranunculus leaves and flowers?
